The container is your choice! Feel free to get creative in representing our annual meeting theme. You will have a space of 24" by 24" for your display with no height restriction. Please include written educational information about your water tolerant plant including:

- botanical and common names of plant
- preferred growing conditions and cultivation tips
- country of origin if introduced or native
- any noteworthy characteristics and garden uses
- include a photo of your plant in bloom if it is not blooming at the time of the meeting (if available-not mandatory)

Please do not include any invasive plants in your display.

Your horticulture exhibits will be displayed at the Renaissance Hotel Portsmouth Waterfront, 425 Water Street, Portsmouth, VA 23704, where the GCV business meetings will take place. Exhibits should be placed between 2:00-5:00pm on Tuesday May 7, 2019. Please have your exhibit in place before the meeting begins on Wednesday afternoon.
