Stoneleigh Estate 375 EDGEWOOD DRIVE, STANLEYTOWN



Stoneleigh is a historic estate that once served as the home of Governor Thomas B. Stanley Sr. and his wife, Ann.

It is now owned by Brendan and Tessa Sullivan of Melbourne, Australia. This mansion, constructed in the Elizabethan-Tudor style between 1929 and 1931, is nestled within 56 serene acres adorned with meticulously restored gardens connected by charming brick pathways. The exterior is crafted from locally sourced stone from the Smith River and features eight bedrooms and six and a half bathrooms. The formal garden boasts a reflection pool embellished with lily pads and goldfish. The interior design of Stoneleigh blends European influences with both modern and traditional furnishings. This estate is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmarks Register. The estate has participated in Historic Garden Week in 1953, 1982, and 2014.

Hillcroft 1024 THE GREAT ROAD, FIELDALE



Shown by Cindy and Steve Edgerton, Hillcroft was built on the prerevolutionary stagecoach road called The Great Road, which ran from

Philadelphia to Georgia. Hillcroft is a historic home with unique architectural features. The 1740s saltbox style, typical of New England, includes two corner fireplaces. The 1814 Traylor wing has the main entrance, living room, and primary bedroom, with original woodwork like wedding ring molding and paneled wainscoting. The 1841 Rangeley addition, built with handmade bricks, includes a second-story traveler's room. In the 1930s, Dr. and Mrs. A. Warren Rucker added plumbing, heating, electricity, and a kitchen wing, restoring parts of the house with period-appropriate materials. Dr. and Mrs. Mervyn King, who purchased the house in the 1960s, added a fifth wing with a recreation room. Each wing is on a different level due to the challenging terrain. Hillcroft was featured in historical tours in 1955, 1967, 1973, and 1990.

The Chatham House 44 OLD MEADOW DR, STANLEYTOWN



Originally the home of Anne Bassett Stanley Chatham, this 8,750-square-foot brick house now belongs to the

Patrick & Henry Community College Foundation. Dr. Greg and Renee Hodges' home features luxurious, custom-designed spaces with unique light fixtures, drapery, plantation shutters, molding, wall coverings, and custom rugs. The living room has a dark green marble fireplace with intricate carvings, while the garden room connects the living area to the back gardens via brick walkways. The primary bedroom offers a private garden view and leads to a spacious walk-through closet with vanity and bathing areas. The kitchen includes a central kitchen, serving kitchen, and bar. A work area with a full bath serves the house manager, and the second floor has two separate guest quarters.

TOUR HEADQUARTERS Bassett Train Station 3536 Fairystone Park Highway, Bassett



The Historic Bassett Train Depot is a landmark in the community of Bassett, Virginia. The once fully functioning passenger station, now serves as a gorgeous event center.

The Bassett Train Station, which operated passenger trains until mid-1957, now serves as the Bassett Train Station Event Center, accommodating up to 200 guests. The main hall, originally the depot's shipping and receiving warehouse, features rustic white brick walls and wooden sliding doors, making it ideal for receptions and concerts. Additionally, a large kitchen and gathering room offer space for smaller events. This venue combines historic charm with modern amenities for unforgettable occasions.
