AUGUSTA COUNTY

Experience the beauty and rich history of Augusta County, which was founded in 1738 in the Shenandoah Valley. This Augusta Garden Club Historic Garden Week driving tour explores Mount Sidney and Fort Defiance, a quick 15-minute drive north of Staunton. Tributaries of the Shenandoah River wind through the picturesque rolling hills of these charming villages. This rural area features agriculture, vineyards, hiking trails, and battlefields, as well as houses that served as safe havens, hospitals, and military headquarters during the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Two of these historic properties are among the four private homes featured on this tour, which spotlights the architecture and history of the area from the 18th through the 20th centuries.

1 Belvidere Farm, 705 Knightly Lane, Mt. Sidney



A 65-acre working farm, Belvidere sits on the 1864 Civil War Battle of Piedmont battlefield. During the encounter, it served as both Confederate field hospital and Union commander headquarters, with hundreds

of Union troops bivouacked in the yard. Local Staunton archives record that 2nd Lt. William McKinley, later President of the United States, took a bribe to spare the barn from pillage during the Shenandoah Valley Campaign. The McCue Family founded Belvidere in the 1830s, living there until the Meyer Family purchased it in 2009.

2 Dundore, 1413 Lee Highway, Fort Defiance



Built in the 1700s and known locally as the Suter House, Dundore is a small center-hall gable-roofed colonial with two original stone chimneys. In 1942, Mrs. Elizabeth Dundore Suter engaged Staunton

architects T.J. Collins & Sons to remodel Dundore, adding the garage and kitchen wings and opening it up for entertaining. This well-appointed home has a four-acre park-like property featuring mature trees, a peach orchard, a spring-fed pond, and walled vegetable garden.

Note: Dundore is not ADA-compliant and has narrow doorways, stairs, and uneven ground.

3 Orchard Hill, 186 Willow Spout Road, Fort Defiance

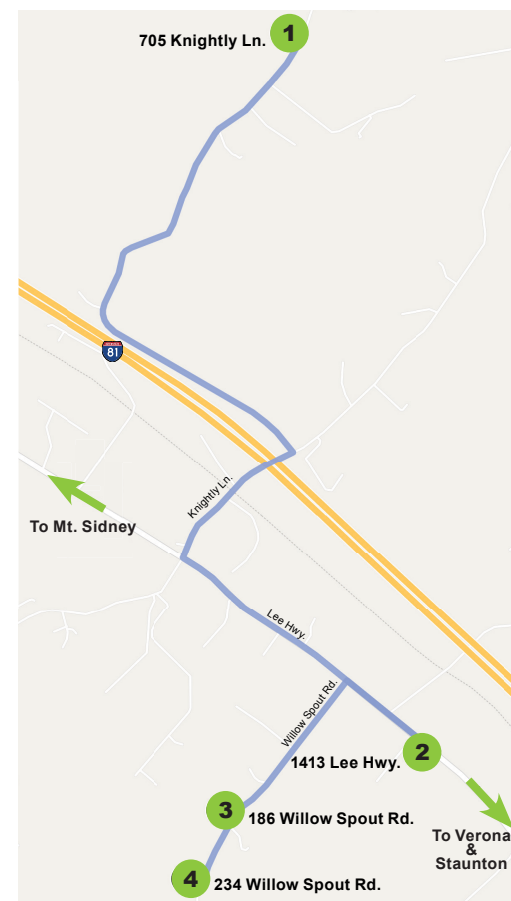

Places of Interest: Woodrow Wilson Birthplace, Museum & Presidential Library, 20 N. Coalter Street



President Woodrow Wilson was born in this Greek Revival manse in 1856. In an early restoration project, the Garden Club of Virginia engaged landscape architect Charles Gillette to design the terraced rear gardens in 1934. GCV's additional work spanned almost eight decades at the museum. The loss of the Gillette bowknot garden to boxwood blight prompted extensive archaeological work and revealed a treasure trove of artifacts to better understand the history of the site. Be sure to visit the temporary exhibit "Andrei Kushnir: Painting in the Valley" at the Woodrow Wilson Presidential Library, where renowned artist Andrei Kushnir's stunning landscape paintings capture the natural beauty of the Shenandoah Valley. Garden lovers will particularly appreciate Kushnir's masterful en plein air technique, which, like gardening itself, celebrates the vivid colors and changing light of the outdoors. This special exhibit is open from March through April.
